PRE-CONFERENCE ETHICS WORKSHOP

"Ethically and Practically Speaking: Managing Your Malpractice Risk as a Social Worker"

This session, developed especially for social workers, is sponsored by NASW Assurance Services, Inc. (ASI) of Frederick, MD, and describes the most significant malpractice risks in social work today and numerous methods of mitigating and reducing one's risk of being sued for malpractice.

The presentation is intended for social workers in all settings and positions, not just the clinical, therapeutic mental health setting. The session will cover key concepts in risk management, such as confidentiality and its exceptions, duty to warn, and informed consent. The seminar will reveal the major reasons why social workers are sued and what you can do about those risks. We will define what constitutes a malpractice case and emphasize important recordkeeping issues, guidelines for supervision, special tips for clinical and private practitioners, and brief you about your malpractice insurance, its special features and implications for your practice.

A free attendee toolkit will be distributed at the workshop which contains information about ASI, the workshop presenters, resources for managing your malpractice risk, insurance FAQs, and insurance applications.

Terrie Fritz, MSW, LCSW, is Director of Child Health at the Oklahoma Health Care Authority and Adjunct Professor at OU-Norman where she teaches policy and practice courses. Terrie has held many offices for NASW: President of the Oklahoma Chapter, Chair of the National Committee on Ethics, Vice Chair of the Board of Directors of Assurance Services (formerly the Insurance Trust), Chair of the Delegate Assembly. She has also served a term on the National Board of Directors.

KEYNOTE ADDRESS:

National leaders continue to work on health care reform issues for our country. What they decide will impact many policy and coverage decisions for Oklahoma's SoonerCare and Insure Oklahoma programs as well as private insurance. Mr. Fogarty's keynote address will shed light on the national debate and issues related to reform, as well as Oklahoma's direction and initiatives in covering the uninsured. He will discuss how Social Workers can impact reform efforts and will dialogue with participants about their ideas and concerns regarding healthcare reform.

Mike Fogarty, MSW, JD is the Chief Executive Officer of the Oklahoma Health Care Authority (OHCA). The agency administers the Oklahoma SoonerCare (Medicaid/SCHIP) Programs, serving over 800,000 Oklahomans with a budget of nearly \$4.3 billion. He joined the agency in 1995 as the State Medicaid Director and Chief Operating Officer.

WORKSHOP #6

"Pets and Patients: The Role of the Human-Animal Bond in Life and Death"

This workshop will discuss how the human-animal bond plays a significant role in health care and hospice in regards to the increasing importance of pets in the family system. Ways that pets significantly influence the physical, emotional, and spiritual well being of patients undergoing life transitions will be discussed. The impact of a new program designed to assist hospice patients with pet-related needs in order to maintain their relationships with companion animals in the home will also be addressed.

WORKSHOP #7

"No Place Like Home: Learning from Decision Cases"

The case-based method is specifically designed to promote critical thinking at multiple system levels, and to encourage participants to "think like a social worker". These particular case topics are self-determination, informed consent, cultural competence with Native Americans, and competence in mental health settings.

WORKSHOP #8

"Who's Going to Stand for Health Care Reform for GLBTQ Youth, Families, and Employees"

"We have a non-discrimination clause in our policy and procedures. What else do we need?" Surveys show a continued "serious lack of awareness and understanding of GLBT issues by health care providers." We will review standards and indicators identified by the Access Project out of Boston, including personnel, client rights, assessment, service delivery and planning, confidentiality, and community outreach and health promotion. We will also review the NASW policy statements from Social Work Speaks regarding the role of social workers to advocate for policy changes within our own agencies and with our own employers. After a review of needed policies, we will also have a discussion about the perceived barriers to change within our own state agencies, and strategies for affecting change within our own organizations and agencies.

Taylor Burns, LCSW is a therapist with the Shadow Mountain Behavioral Health Systems and has a small private practice.

WORKSHOP #9

"Health Outcomes of Adults with Out-of-home Care Experiences During Childhood: An Analysis Across Ethnic Groups"

Using the Casey Family Programs National Alumni Study sample, this presentation will examine the relationship between ethnicity and adult physical health for 810 adults who experienced out-of-home care during childhood. The presentation will present findings on participants with successful health outcomes and a variety of predictors of adult health. Recommendations for practice and research will be advanced in the presentation.

WORKSHOP #10

“Legislative Process: Lobbying 101”

This presentation will serve as a skills building session for citizen lobbying. The workshop will create comfort in the legislative process and help social workers become citizen activists.

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WORKSHOP #12

“Oklahoma Health Care Authority: Changes and Opportunities”

This workshop will provide updates to what is going on in behavioral health at the Oklahoma Health Care Authority. It will focus on new opportunities for masters level licensed behavioral health practitioners in private practice who wish to obtain individual contracts for serving SoonerCare members. It will also open up discussion from participants for other questions regarding SoonerCare and Insure Oklahoma policy, and ancillary issues affecting the mental health and substance abuse delivery system in Oklahoma. It will cover current and projected policy updates.

Leah S. Taylor, PhD, LPC, LMFT, has been a behavioral health practitioner for more than 35 years. She is currently a Behavioral Health Specialist with the Oklahoma Health Care Authority in charge of stakeholder relations and provider training. She also worked for several years developing training programs for North Care Center, directing Behavioral Health activities at the Oklahoma Foundation for Medical Quality.

WORKSHOP #13

“Veteran’s Initiative”

This workshop will present what Tulsa is doing (under the leadership of the Community Service Council) to address needs to returning veterans from the Iraq and Afghanistan wars. The initiative incorporates leadership from the mayor’s office, education institutions, social service providers, employment services and Veterans Court (a unique court to assist veterans charged with various offenses). The list of organizations and agencies involved in this initiative is comprehensive. Noteworthy is that returning soldiers (nearly 20%) present with PTSD and/or traumatic brain injuries. Additionally, Oklahoma is considered a high deployment state—meaning that we have a large group of veterans returning to the state.

Lanny Endicott, D. Min., MSSW, LCSW is director of the social work program at Oral Roberts University. He also teaches social work in Russia and consults with child welfare workers in Oklahoma. He is currently president of the Board of NASW-OK.

WORKSHOP #14

“Concerns, Needs, Narratives of Women in a County Jail: Implications for Social Work”

This session will offer early findings from a survey of women entering the Cleveland County Jail and will identify their needs that hold important implications for the provision of social work services. The needs assessment focuses on domains relevant for social work including family situation, employment and vocational background, dental and health care needs, and educational background.

Suzanne Taylor is a Graduate Assistant and Research Specialist at the Cleveland County Jail and a graduate student at the Anne and Henry Zarrow School of Social Work at the University of Oklahoma. Rock Richardson is the coordinator of Mental Health Service at the Cleveland County Jail in Norman, Oklahoma. David Moxley, Ph.D., is Medicaid Endowed Professor of Community Practice and Social Action at the Anne and Henry Zarrow School of Social Work at the University of Oklahoma.

WORKSHOP #15

“Health and Hope: Faith and Community Groups Provide Compassion and Services”

“SCHOOL TOOLS for Social Workers: Research Proven Standards and Legal Resources Effective in Reducing School Bullying”

This session is designed to help schools learn about and implement evidence-based bullying prevention. The session will provide information about what Oklahoma students want most from adults to help them feel safe at school. Participants will be able to connect with legal resources available to Oklahoma communities so that together, we can make the school atmosphere conducive to learning so that children can concentrate on an excellent education rather than fear of public humiliation and/or assault from school bullying.

Kathy Middleton Morgan, LCSW, LCDC works as a medical social worker and school consultant in Dallas, Texas. Kathy has provided bullying prevention trainings. She provided consultation in the passage of the Oklahoma Anti-Bullying Act (2002). Kathy coordinated a bullying prevention research study in Oklahoma reaching more than 7,000 students and co-authored the article “Children’s Perceptions of Bullying in Oklahoma Public Schools”, published in the Journal of School Violence (2009). Kayla A. Bower, J.D., is the director and senior litigation attorney at Oklahoma Disability Law Center.
